Dear Parish Councillors and Residents, welcome to this my latest edition of my ward report I hope you find it interesting and there is a 'useful information' section at the end. This report is prepared from information from Herefordshire Council and other councillor sources so that I may provide a comprehensive review of the County activities.

Unfortunately the summer sunshine has turned back to masses of rain and although the forecast ahead looks to be improving nothing is guaranteed so please do be careful when travelling as heavy showers often lead to slippery road surfaces. Please take care when driving especially through standing water.

Council Matters

The Council accounts for 2023/24 were approved by the Audit and Governance committee last week and can now be officially signed off by the auditors. There is a real capacity issue in England about local authority auditors but despite this Herefordshire should be one of the first councils to publish audited accounts before the government deadline.

Housing Supply

The Council has responded to the government's proposals on new housing targets



where Herefordshire is expected to increase its house building over the next 20 years from 773 to 1,375 per year.

The point is made that there is unlikely to be a local market demand for that quantity, and there isn't the capacity within the local building market to deliver that number. In a county with high house prices and lower incomes the delivery of more affordable homes will

become an issue as the market focusses on 3/4 bedroom detached residences rather than smaller family homes. You all know my views also about building more suitable homes for the maturing population.

Councils have to show that they have a five year supply of building land and if they can't then sites not identified through open processes can start to get permission. The high level of projected numbers would increase the risk of this.

Herefordshire is one of England's most rural counties and is relatively lacking in public transport infrastructure with only four railway stations and traffic congestion. Rural bus services require continued support and subsidy. It has a higher proportion (21%) who travel 20km or more, compared to England and Wales (15%). This level of growth will mean increased commuting as the county is more limited with economic options. Gross Domestic Product (GDP) per head of population which is a measure of relative economic prosperity, is significantly lower than the national GDP. The county doesn't have the economic base to work with such high housing targets. More employment land and significant infrastructure will need to be planned to avoid unsustainable commuting.

Key sectors in Herefordshire, which need further support and nurturing include:

Infrastructure plays a large part in this level of delivery and it would work better if organisations such as the water companies and utility providers were more aligned to future growth ambitions but their plans do not work in the same way. They should be better at considering strategic and Local Plans; if growth is the ambition of central government.

The existing highway system has issues that need urgent investment if more house building is to be delivered. There will need also need to be more public investment in health care including Dentistry.

If the government are sensible they may well revisit the high number allocated initially and reduce it but it will still leave the problems outlined above; which remain needing urgent attention.

National Fire Memorial service



A matter dear to my heart being a retired fire officer in London. A wreath on behalf of the Hereford & Worcester Fire Service in memory of firefighters who lost their lives while protecting others was made by the chairman of the council. The service was attended by representatives all the English Fire Authorities and importantly

members of families of lost firefighters.

The Memorial is at the National Memorial Arboretum at Alrewas near Burton on Trent in Staffordshire and is the national focus of remembering primary military but also other public service organisations people lost in action or peacetime. Admission is free although booking a time slot is sensible - I would recommend a visit. More details at the nma.org.uk

Flooding and Immediate Emergency Relief

Flooding has affected several areas of the county this week following torrential rainfall. Last weekend a month's worth of rain fell in just three hours and the sheer volume of water meant that some systems were overwhelmed. The further heavy rain over the past few days has meant we've been dealing with ongoing issues throughout the week in Ross-on-Wye. Our highways teams have been on the ground taking action to reduce standing water where possible and supporting the clear-up as Ross has received a phenomenal amount of rainfall which has overtaken the ability for the drains to take it away.

I'm sure you'll join me to thank everyone who worked throughout the weekend and overnight this week to respond including members of the highways team, emergency planning team and communications team.

With further flooding expected this winter, we're asking for information to be shared with us about which areas were flooded on this occasion, as this will help us to plan. This can be reported on our website at <u>Flood management – Herefordshire Council</u>.

We would particularly like to stress that the council doesn't provide sandbags so these need to be sourced from local builder's merchants.

DOORSTEP SCAMS - Beware

These were around long before Scammers took to the Internet but do still exist today. Basically, these are cold callers on your doorstep either selling goods and services, or, has been reported recently, attempting to buy high value items on the doorstep such as gold, silver, jewellery or antiques.

Everyone has come across at some time those persons trying to sell cleaning materials backed up by a story of being an ex-offender and trying to make a new life. Or it may have been the "tradesman" offering to repair or clean your roof, clean your block paving or re-lay your tarmac drive.

Dealing with someone face to face on the doorstep puts the householder under extra pressure and these scammers will always try and smooth talk you, or pressure you, into agreeing to something you never really wanted.

So how can you protect yourself?

- Firstly, always be on your guard and be suspicious of anyone turning up out of the blue and uninvited a sign at the door saying uninvited callers not welcome can often help
- Never let any stranger into your home, and also be aware of distraction callers when one person keeps you talking, whilst their partner goes around the back of the property to gain entry
- Use of Smart Doorbells with cameras are a good deterrent, and also gives you the facility to talk to them without opening the door
- Anyone selling goods door to door should be in possession of a "Pedlar's Licence" which you can ask to see
- Always ask for an ID to prove they, and their business, are genuine
- Never be rushed into signing up for a deal, and always ask for written quotations on their company headed notepaper so you can check they are genuine; it is also helpful to ask for references for a tradesman's previous customers
- You can also get your Utility Companies to set up a Password so then you know

when someone claiming to be from the Electric, Gas, Telephone or Water Company is genuine

• If the caller remains persistent then call the Police, either 999 if urgent, or 101 if you do not feel in immediate danger

Please feel free to share this information with any family, friends, or neighbours that you think it may be able to assist.

Take Five to Stop Fraud - Beware

STOP: Taking a moment to stop and think before parting with your money or information could keep you safe.

CHALLENGE: Could it be fake? It's OK to reject, refuse or ignore any requests. Only criminals will try to rush or panic you.

PROTECT: Contact your bank immediately if you think you've fallen for a scam and report it to Action Fraud

ALWAYS REMEMBER:

- Avoid disclosing security details
- Emails, Phone Calls and Texts may not be authentic
- Always make direct contact with any organisation by using a genuine phone number
- Stop and Challenge any unexpected requests
- Protect others by reporting Fraud and Scams

If you think your bank account or personal banking details have been used fraudulently, then use the short phone number - **159** - to contact the Fraud Prevention Department of most major UK banks.

Road Safety

Last year, across West Mercia police force area, 56 people lost their lives in collisions and 468 people suffered serious injuries, just under a quarter of these involved someone between the age of 16-24. Common causation factors listed in these collisions include:

- Speeding or inappropriate speed
- Distractions, such as mobile phone
- Driving under the influence of drink or drugs

Not wearing a seatbelt.

Keeping those who use our roads safe is a year-round priority and enforcing the law around these issues takes place across Herefordshire, Shropshire and Worcestershire 24/7.



Following a successful operation in July where 1333 road offences were detected and 12,000 motorists caught speeding in our area, the National Police Chiefs' Council (NPCC) will be focusing on 'Operation Spotlight' from 23 September – 6 October. The national operation will recognise the

significant contributory factor these issues have in road traffic collisions, in particular with younger drivers/riders and will highlight the work that we do every day to tackle these.

Report fly tippers

If you spot someone fly-tipping

- Make a note of any vehicle used, including model, colour and registration number. If it is safe to do so without being seen, take a photograph or video of the activity
- Note the fly tippers' clothes, and distinguishing features. If you can hear the fly tippers, take note of anything which was said along with the speakers' accents
- Make a note of what they dumped, the location, weather conditions and how far away you were at the time;
- You may report fly tipping on an app on the website and available for download.
