Dear Residents

January always seems to be a long month and the sight of snowdrops and some daffodils emerging certainly is a welcome sign that spring is on its way.

With regard to spending power, urban authorities have over 40% more spending power than predominately rural authorities, where rural households will pay on average 20% higher council tax than their urban counterpart. More details of our Rural Services Network website - www.rsnonline.org.uk



The chairman of the council travelled to a six form college in south London to attend the first main meeting of the Education Secretary of State Bridget Phillipson MP new strategic Working Together Board. The Minister -pictured in centre in white chaired the meeting made up of seven union and seven employer representatives to oversee where we can improve workforce,

special educational needs and accountable systems (the amount of reporting and inspections in schools). Issues of pay, declining pupil behaviour, retention of staff and identifying current workload pressures were discussed covering all aspects of education from rising 5 years old to collages. A concern is that the pressures of the rural provision of education was not being identified. There are less young families in rural areas with smaller schools and while cooperative and academy models can help support there are still financial and teaching pressures that need to be properly evaluated.

The Council were notified by Lugg Valley Travel on 21st January that they no longer intend to operate their routes in the County, which included 5 school routes and 11 public routes, with immediate effect. The council's transport team worked tirelessly to ensure all the routes were covered by other local bus operators leaving no gaps in service. The team will continue to liaise with other operators to discuss the opportunities longer term and safeguard the routes.

The Government has issued its provisional financial settlement to all local authorities just before Christmas and regrettably Herefordshire along with many other rural areas has lost out to urban councils.

The Government has scrapped the Rural Services Delivery Grant worth £7.1 million to us and although it has increased social care grants this struggles to meet the increase in care contracts costs caused by their own increase in National Insurance, lowering of the NI threshold, and

The Council is proposing a revenue budget for 2025/26 of £231.5 million pounds which will require savings of £6.9 million pounds and of which £146.5 million will come from Council Tax including an estimated £3.1 million from second and holiday homes. This will mean an increase in Council tax of 4.99% including the social care 2% levy and will be subject to scrutiny and discussion within the councils processes. A 1% increase in council tax raises just under £1.4 million. The budget papers continue the freeze on car parking charges and local support for Parish councils on Drainage, lengthsmen and Rights of way.

In the Capital budget there is more flexibility and this includes an additional 10 million spending on resurfacing and highway infrastructure, also an additional 3 million for road safety schemes and one million for flood risk measures. Work will continue on the Shirehall to ensure the building will reopen in 2026, and the council will prepare for the new highways contract when Balfour's period ends in June 2026.

The council also wants to tackle its huge transport bill for special education transport currently costing in the region of 4.5 million pounds. This is where children identified with particular needs are taken to school in taxi type services. By purchasing some vehicles we hope to ensure better value for money.

The big element however is the commitment to begin the Hereford bypass with phase one from the A49 south of Hereford to the A465 Abergavenny highways. This was originally funded by government, planning permission gained and compulsory land purchases made. However under the Green/Independent administration the scheme was dropped and the land sold back and the funding lapsed. The current administration will borrow the 30 million required and seek support from government for the remainder of the highway from the A465 to the A49 to the west of the city.

Rural Services Network - Council Challenge

Herefordshire Council stands firmly alongside the Rural Services Network (RSN) in challenging the recent provisional local government finance settlement, which significantly disadvantages rural communities like ours.

The settlement unfairly favours urban areas, neglecting the unique needs and higher operational costs of rural local authorities. Supported by detailed analysis from the RSN, we

identify a critical funding disparity where Government Funded Spending Power in urban areas is 41 % higher than it is in predominantly rural areas.

Government Housing requirement

As some will be aware the current government has required the country to support their target of 1.5 million new homes built over the next 20 years. For Herefordshire this is a total build of over 27,260 houses in the County over the next 20 years. This equates to an annual demand for us to increase our rate of house building by 60% to 1,363 houses per year before the next general election, assuming the current government remains in power. This against a background of shortage of local construction workers with 40% of the county impacted by the phosphate issue. This shows no understanding of our existing problems; currently Herefordshire has approx. 80,000 residences. The main focus of these will be around Hereford- without investment in infrastructure it is difficult to see how the county can cope.

Council budgets and spending – Herefordshire Council

Herefordshire Council's Cabinet has agreed proposals of £58million, with £21million planned for investment in the coming financial year Cabinet agrees additional capital investment budget proposals for 2025/26

Warm Local Grants

Herefordshire Council is currently accepting expressions of interest for the new Warm Homes Local Grant scheme.



The aim of the scheme, which will launch in April 2025, is to improve as many fuel poor homes as possible, helping to reduce energy bills for the occupants, and deliver carbon savings in upgraded homes.

Grants will be available for properties in Energy Performance Certificate (EPC) bands D, E, F and G across Herefordshire, subject to criteria. The scheme will run until March 2028, and will follow a whole house approach and ensure the building has

appropriate windows, doors and insulation before looking at heating systems.

To apply for the fund your gross annual household income must be below £36,000 per year or you must be in receipt of means-tested benefits.

Green light for plans to renovate Hereford's Shirehall

Approval has been given to transform Hereford's Shirehall into a new community space including an innovative library and learning centre.

The renovation of Hereford's Shirehall into a new community space and modern library and learning centre took another step forward this week, when the proposals received planning permission and listed building consent. The redevelopment is being funded through the council with a £3 million contribution for the library and learning centre element from the Stronger Towns Fund. The design has been carefully considered to complement the Shirehall's heritage while allowing the much-needed restoration. I'm looking forward to seeing this work get underway in the next few months.

Highways



I am pleased to welcome three new Balfour Stewards, starting this January – this brings the compliment up to 12. The relationship between Parish clerks, myself and our Balfour steward is so important as we try to deal with our large mileage of highways and their problems.

Parish councils employ lengthsmen which Herefordshire council gives additional funding during the year to support more local work being done by parish lengthsmen. The pictures opposite show the ditching work undertaken to help reduce flooding on the highway by parish lengthsmen and I believe that targeting funding at this level helps get local

problems better sorted and better value for money. I am pleased to see a continued commitment in next year's budget to this scheme.

I attended a recent briefing with Balfour on highways Annual Plan 25/26 and ward and parish councils were pleased to hear that the Council and Balfour had agreed a better action on pothole repairs to overcome the problem of two potholes filled while three next door are left untouched. Small reactive patching and larger structural patching will be introduced

where there is a weak area to prevent continued return of teams. Using mastic asphalt and a cold lay product for more flexible use in the winter and wet.

All our A and B highways and most of the unclassified highways will be surveyed each year by scanner and video also skid resistance of sensitive sections, this is feed into an AI process which prioritises the highways. The amount of different potholes that are reported by the public and the visual inspections of Balfour Steward are also used to finalise the capital programme.

Registration Services

Booking an appointment with the council's Registration Service to register a birth, give notice of marriage, or to book a registrar for a wedding, is now much quicker and easier thanks to a new online booking system.

The Registration Service is based at 8 St Owen Street in Hereford. Appointments to visit the service must be booked in advance so that all the correct paperwork can be prepared.

Fire Authority consultation

All Fire Services regularly review their risks and resources and have a Community Risk Management Plan and HWFRS are currently consulting on their draft Plan.

While continuing to identify dwelling and other building fires, road traffic collisions, water incidents as well as waste and heritage fires, the plan from 2025-2030 also recognises increase risks from Climate change of wildfires and more flooding. There are also aims and activities in prevention, protection, valuing the workforce and maintaining resilience.

There are no proposals to close any local fire stations and of course during the plan period the new Hereford station and Leominster training centre will be built.

 If it is safe to do so without being seen, take a photograph or video of the activity
- Note the fly tippers' clothes, and distinguishing features. If you can hear the fly tippers, take note of anything which was said along with the speakers' accents
- Make a note of what they dumped, the location, weather conditions and how far
 away you were at the time;
- You may report fly tipping on an app on the website and available for download.
